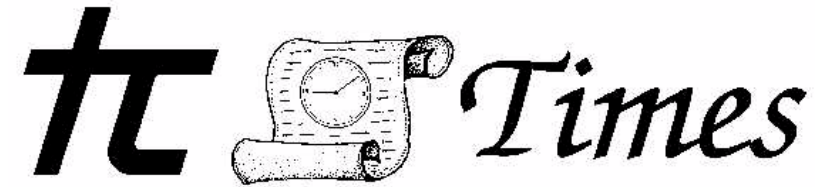

THERFIELD CHAPEL BOOKS reviewed on 4th May 2008

MEND THE GAP by Jason Gardner (IVP £8.99)

Can the church reconnect the generations?

For anyone wanting to seriously consider how to address the ever widening gap between the generations - especially in churches. Throughout the book the author reflects on how today's culture has shaped the way we reach and teach young people, and how the church needs to take the reins back and lead in the way we treat our young people. Examples are given of pioneers in this area, and resources are listed at the back of the book. Difficult to do this book justice in just a few sentences.

ONE STEP BEYOND by Gram Seed (£7.99)

One man's journey from near death to new life.

What road takes a Middlesbrough lad from a life of crime and addiction, to the Bible?

Gram Seed was that lad, written off by family, neighbours, teachers and the police as a lost cause, his early life taking him through shoplifting, football hooliganism, multiple stabbings and beatings, alcoholism, drug addiction, homelessness and several jail sentences, to a six-day coma.

In this book Gram tells how, following his miraculous recovery and rehabilitation, and with the strength of his new-found faith, he has established the Sowing Seeds Ministries - through which he shows young prisoners and ex-offenders that there is a much better alternative.

Christianity, Climate Change and Sustainable Living

by Nick Spencer & Robert White (SPCK £9.99)

Our current habits of consumption and production in the West cannot be maintained. The way we live, in particular the way we generate and use energy, is no longer environmentally sustainable. We urgently need to reconsider our lifestyles and the policies that shape them.

This book represents the first serious Christian engagement with the emerging issue of sustainable consumption and production.
